Annual Report for Year of 1991

(Pursuant to Section 1901.14, Ohio Revised Code)

The report of the operations of this Court in 1991 shows it to have experienced the second highest caseload in its history, with an increase in new cases filed of some 4,300 cases over the number reported in 1990. Only in 1988 were there more new cases than the 26,616 new cases filed and reactivated in 1991.

A listing of criminal and traffic offenses by charge, omitted from last year's report because of the recency of computer conversion, has been restored. The new computer system has enabled us to give you a detailed breakdown of offenses that was not possible before, especially for traffic cases. Of special significance is the large increase in code charges associated with housing and building maintenance. Not surprisingly a record high occurred in housing cases referred to John Gustat, the Court's housing specialist, whose one on one intensive work with code violators continues to achieve results. His report to the Court is included herein for your perusal. The Court is gratified to learn of the creation of a similar city position of violations counselor established in the hope of reducing citations for non-compliance, especially for minor violations.

On pages reporting collections and disbursements I call your attention to other changes. Past annual reports have shown Court payments to the City of Cleveland Heights of large sums collected as parking fines and costs by the Court's Violations Bureau. However, in 1990 the Court became aware of a procedure in use in Ashland, Ohio and the Ashland Municipal Court whereby parking violations became subject to penalties set by law instead of fines and court costs, and discussed the procedures with City officials. Under such a system penalties are payable directly to the General Fund on a daily basis instead of remaining in the Court account for pay over to the City at the end of the month, as required by state law for court costs and fines. Council's consideration of the advantages of direct daily payment of amounts that had regularly totalled close to \$500,000 annually led to similar legislation in Cleveland Heights. Complaints and summonses to Court are still issued for multiple tickets. contested violation becomes a court case, of course, and may result in imposition of fines and costs set in Court.

The new ordinance pertaining to parking penalties went into effect on the first of the past year. Its enactment explains the changes in disbursements by the Court to the City. Our annual report of 1990 showed payments to the city of \$438,000 in parking fines and costs. This year pay-ins for parking fines and costs totalled \$30,830, representing fines collected in December 1990. Fines on parking cases brought to Court are included in criminal and traffic fines. However, the decrease in parking fines was partially offset by a large increase in fines and costs collected in moving traffic and other misdemeanors in 1991.

The use of "court costs" to fund state programs such as the Reparations Rotary Fund (for victims of crimes) and the General Revenue Fund for the state public defender's office continues to show the liklihood of being expanded, with new bills introduced each session of the Ohio General Assembly. practice works to the disadvantage of cities, especially in times of recession, when the collection of fines and costs becomes difficult, inasmuch as state costs come off of the top. General Assembly has also taken action to prohibit Court suspension of all court costs without a specific finding of indigence in a given case. Therefore, all costs must be included in all waiverable offenses, increasing the waiverable amount to such a degree that some no longer pay it. As for fines and costs imposed in Court, a new session of time to pay hearings has had to be created by the Court in 1991 to comply with the legislative edict requiring indigency findings.

RE: The 1991 year in review

During 1991 a record high 76 cases were referred to me. Almost one-half of these cases (37) came during the last trimester.

Of the total referral of 76, 24 have since been closed (32%). There are three warrants outstanding for the year.

Because of its ability to work with marginally credit worthy clients and construct payment schedules according to ability to pay, the FHC Housing Corporation continues to be the community organization best able to meet the loan needs of my referrals.

The Housing Preservation Office's Deferred Loan programs have been helpful as usual and the City's new nuisance abatement program for severe housing problems removed an obviously difficult case from the docket.

The Office on Aging has been instrumental this year in helping close out a few of our cases. One of the most intractable cases involved an aging defendant who had developed psychological problems complicated by malnutrition and alcoholism. With the help of the defendant's son and the Office on Aging, the defendant was probated to her son's care and was sent to a facility which could give her the attention she needed.

As in the past, the majority of cases involve no lender and the money for repairs must come from a combination of sources: family, saving based on goals established (repair schedules), federal tax refunds and sometimes rental income.

Sweat equity remains a staple of the compliance effort and is often enhanced through detailed discussion of what's involved with the various repairs needed. Many defendants want to learn and are often surprised that the violations can be corrected easier and cheaper than they had imagined. The brief periods of time taken to explain the nature of many violations not only fosters greater success but a greater awareness of how manageable most of the code violations are.

Out of 53 cases referred during 1990, 5 remain open. There are three outstanding warrants for 1990, too.
